- We provide a warm, home-like setting for clients to have fun spending time with friends and enjoying the company of the staff and volunteers.
- There is a large, secure, outdoor courtyard with a shaded walking path and benches that the clients may enjoy at any time.
- Clients enjoy a hot, nutritious lunch, table games, and social time as well as the option for rest and relaxation.
- Our loving staff provides personal care and assistance completing activities of daily living that clients may find challenging.
- The Adult Day Center provides respite care services (both on an as-needed or regularly scheduled basis) so that primary caregivers/ families may take time to run errands, go to appointments, or simply take time to rest and rejuvenate themselves.

Whether clients come every day, or are just an occasional drop-in, families of our clients can rest assured their loved ones are in good hands while in our care. It is our goal at the Adult Day Center to make it possible for our elderly clients to maintain the highest possible quality of life and independence during the time they spend with us.

The Adult Day Center serves clients aged 60 years and older who need some supervision and assistance.

Caregiver grants are available to help with the cost of care.

The AO/HRA professional staff include: Psychiatrists, Psychologists, Clinical Social Workers, Professional Counselors, Psychological Examiners and Psychiatric Nurses. The staff all adhere to the Arkansas State Standards for Community Mental Health Centers, Arkansas and Federal Laws and guidelines.

Programming for persons who can benefit from training in community living skills, employment preparation and life enrichment activities is available at Maple Corner (Harrison).

For the individual or family in crisis, the staff of the Center are on call 24 hours a day. The types of problems most often requiring emergency service include emotional problems that are so intense that immediate attention is needed; suicidal or homicidal attempts or threats; call concerning psychiatric medications; and drug or alcohol abuse crises. During regular office hours, call the office number.

Appointments are preferred; please call in advance to reserve a time. Non-appointments in cases of emergency or psychiatric crises will be accepted.

Fees for individual services are obtained through private insurance, V.A., SSDD, Medicaid, Medicare, other third party payers, and self pay.

Provides opportunities for individuals with disabilities to work and lead productive and independent lives.

To begin the vocational rehabilitation process, you will need to fill out an application including an assessment for abilities, interests, and disability-related barriers to employment. Once the application is filled out and returned to the agency, Arkansas Rehabilitation Services will call you to set up an appointment. At the appointment, you will meet with a vocational counselor who will start the process of determining if you are eligible for services. The applicant is usually determined eligible or ineligible within 60 days. A person is eligible if he/she has a disability and requires vocational rehabilitation services to prepare for, secure, retain, or regain employment.
